Salt And Light

As we begin a new year everyone is looking for ways to make this year better than last. We're going to lose weight, kick a bad habit, start a good habit, or any number of things we "resolve" to do. As Christians we usually try to do the same thing. We resolve to spend more time in the word or in prayer, draw closer to God, or be better at talking to our friends about Jesus. As I was thinking about this whole process of setting goals for our year, and what we should be keeping in mind while setting these goals, Jesus' words from the Sermon on the Mount jumped out to me.

"You are the salt of the earth. But if the salt loses its saltiness, how can it be made salty again? It is no longer good for anything, except to be thrown out and trampled underfoot. You are the light of the world. A town built on a hill cannot be hidden. Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house. Let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven." – Matthew 5:13-16

It is believed there are over 14,000 uses for salt. It is one of the most useful substances on earth. You don't throw out salt. Period. It's too useful. It can be used for any number of things from cleaning your sink to your stinky shoes, from shelling pecans to removing onion stink from your hands. In the ancient world it was an absolute necessity because without refrigeration it was the only way to preserve foods. Most cultures had to import salt, but Israel had a ready source of salt in the Dead Sea. However, while the Dead Sea is ten times as salty as the ocean it is not good quality salt. In 2006, they did a study that showed that only 12-18% of Dead Sea salt is actually sodium chloride. In the ocean that number is closer to 97%. That is a lot of impurities in your salt. So if something happened to your bag of Dead Sea salt it was possible for all of the actual salt to dissolve out and now you don't have a bag of salt crystals, but a bag of crystal impurities. And that bag doesn't have any of the uses that a bag of salt would. When you have a bag of something as useful as salt you put that on the top shelf of the pantry where it doesn't get bumped over, spilled, or wasted for any reason. However, if you find that bag is just a bag of something as common as dirt you don't put that in the pantry. You don't even keep that in your house, if you keep it at all. Chances are you're going to throw it out.

That is what Jesus warns will happen to us if we lose our "saltiness," if we are no longer making a difference in this world. There is a lot of good that needs to be done in this world, and Christians can easily get distracted by a good thing that isn't the main thing and their significance is lost. The YMCA is a great organization. It stands for Young Man's Christian Association. It began in London in 1844 as young men migrated to the city from the countryside. 11 men got together in what was essentially a small group bible study that offered support to young men in this new environment. In the 1860's they began to add dormitories to offer these young men places to stay. In 1869 they started building gymnasiums as well, just as an extension of what all was offered at the YMCA. They started out as a group under the banner of Christ, but as they moved further and further away from the gospel message they became just another community organization. They do great things, don't get me wrong, but what do they offer that is of any permanence? And they aren't alone; the Red Cross, and even some church denominations I could name all began as Christian organizations but have moved away from that which sets us apart and are now simply one of many. And a voice in a crowd is much harder to hear than a voice by itself. If we want our New Year's resolutions to help us make a difference in our community they need to set us apart. We need to look different to make a difference in the lives of those we wish to reach.

It's hard to watch people we love make stupid decisions. I think we all know people who have destroyed their lives by ignoring solid biblical advice and simply living the way they wanted to. I look at people whose lives are simply falling apart, dripping with drama, on a first name basis with the police, and then I look at the Sermon on the Mount and see polar opposites. How many marriages and families have been torn apart by addictions to pornography? Jesus says, "I tell you that anyone who looks at a woman lustfully has already committed adultery with her in his heart." I don't know about you, but every time I hear someone swear on a stack of bibles or on their grandmother's grave or the like, I tend to believe them less and less. That's why Jesus says, "Simply let your 'yes' be 'yes,' and your 'no,' 'no.' How many friend-ships have been broken, feelings hurt, or even lives lost just because, "he started it." Jesus taught, "If someone strikes you on the right cheek, turn to him the other also." This way of life, as backward as it seems to us fallen people, is the hope of humanity. We need to live this difference this year. It is the difference that Christ makes in us that will light the way for the lost.

One quick note in closing about being the light of the world; darkness is the natural state of things. There has to be a source of light, but there doesn't have to be a source of darkness. Light is fundamentally different from darkness. Darkness is simply the lack of light, but because of that darkness cannot push back the light. A light source may not be very powerful and not illuminate much, but it isn't being pushed back by the darkness, it's not holding it in. Darkness can't contain light. No matter how small the light, darkness must flee before it. Ever since The Fall man's natural state has been sinful, but God has been our constant source of light. All throughout history God has been interfering and lighting the way. In the case of the Israelites in the wilderness he did so quite literally as that pillar of fire. And now he lives in us. When we accept him His Spirit comes and makes his dwelling in us. Now we are that light to the world. Don't hide that under a bushel. Don't let Satan blow it out. Let it shine! So when you make your resolutions this year make sure you aren't getting distracted by good things that aren't the main thing so that your saltiness won't get diluted and your light will shine for the whole world to see.
